Screeening/ Educational	Contact Maryland Infants and Toddlers for an evaluation or Click here for more information.	
Educational	Help develop your child's IFSP( Individual Family Service Plan)  Click here for more information.	
Educational	IFSP are reviewed every six months. Make sure to attend your child's IFSP meetings.	
Medical	Create a file for medical information.	
Financial/ Services	Contact DDA regarding eligibility for services.  Click here for more information.	
Educational	At age 2 your child needs an evaluation to see if they will continue to need early intervention or special education services. Once they are eligible at an IEP team meeting, it is your choice if you want remain in Infants &Toddlers or transition to Preschool Special Education Program.	

Note: Transition planning starts at age 2 as it is important to plan what will happen when your child turns 3. A child can continue with IFSP until their 4th birthday or can transition into IEP at age 3 if they qualify. It is the parents choice.

Social	Explore student's community recreation and leisure interests.
